Context and Highlights

Peterborough Preschool and Rural Care Service is located 76-80 Victoria Street, Peterborough.

The preschool operated on odd weeks: Monday and Tuesday and even weeks: Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday from 9 to 3pm.ln 2016 we began with 25 preschool enrolments. Playgroup was also offered on odd Tuesdays from 10-12pm with good numbers this year.

It was staffed with a 0.8 Director, a 0.6 Teacher and a 0.6 ECW for 2016. We had two children with high additional needs requiring preschool support throughout the year. One of these children was an early entry while the other began on a normal preschool program.

The Rural Care Service has a two-worker program on Monday to Wednesday when they have four children present plus before and after school care. On Thursdays and Fridays, a four-worker program operates plus before and after school hour's care.

- Collaboration between Partnership schools, through transitions and site visits.

Once again, the toy catalogue was a success with many taking the opportunity to purchase through them. fundraising has made it possible for a large range of Educational resources to be purchased. furniture for the indoors areas, Ipads for the staff to assist in programming and other electrical equipment, Outdoor mat, and a Mud Kitchen is under construction,

Thank you to Jenny Miles for her commitment to volunteering with the site with the xmas raffle, ensuring books were made and sent out, for co-ordinating the toy catalogue sales, and for ensuring her husband drove the kindy bus to the children's excursions. Without the help and input from parents like Jenny the centre would not be the facility it is! And while I'm mentioning **Excursions:** the children went to Orroroo to see Peter Combe Perform at the Orroroo Area School Stadium, Kerry's Farm,

Visits: Aboriginal Rainbow bus, Dental services, Community Librarian, Sing Australia, Visits from Child studies students from the high school, Fire truck, SAPOL.

Lastly, we have seen the graduation of many children this year, and we have a potential for 23 enrolments at Kindy next year in 2017. Enrolment Comment

In 2016 our enrolments for Term 1 and Term 2 reached 25 preschool children. We were required to submit paperwork to apply to vary our physical capacity as with the 4 Rural Care children our maximum was 22. We did lose some children to St Joseph's Catholic School in term 3 due to the midterm intake they have continued this year; bringing us down to 19 children. We have continued to have ASTI children enrolling. This is pleasing to see that ATSI families are coming in to get enrolment forms just before their child turns three. Currently we have 24 children enrolled for the beginning of 2017.

Attendance Comment

In the past, we have had concerns on attendance, which was mainly on the Tuesday half days in the past. With the introduction of alternate full days, this did improve significantly in 2016. 2016 Term 1 attendance dropped slightly to 80%, however Term 2 and 3 attendances showed a 92% and 84.2% data record. There did continue to be times of the year when attendance was lower and this was due to sickness and medical appointment in Adelaide, Port Pirie or Port Augusta. All absences were followed up with a phone call and reasons entered on EYS. On most occasions the parents have given a reason why their child is not attending and a small portion of absences were due to family holidays being taken during the school term.

Destination Schools Comment

In 2016 the children were split 55.6% to Peterborough Primary School and 44.4% to St Joseph's School Peterborough. Most the families choosing to send their children to St Joseph's Peterborough currently have or have had in the past older siblings at St Joseph's Catholic School. I have been approached by several parents to inform me that they have chosen for their child to be attending St Joseph's Peterborough full time from Term 3 2017. This option may impact on destination school selections in the future. Educators have been continuing to educate parents on the benefits of children attending the full preschool year before beginning there schooling.

Annual Report to the Preschool Community Client Opinion Summary

Surveys were handed out to all families with a small selection returned. Educators attempted to gain a response through placing these within notice pockets and then due to limited returns we then opted to approach parents to fill them in on arrival or dismissal with a clip board. We have also offered the option to hold meetings with individual families this year to discuss their child's progress and any issues or areas for improvement for the site. This was taken up by 3 families. Two surveys were distributed. The first was simplified to focus on our QIP priority, Educational Program and Practice. We received 5 surveys back. One of these surveys identified that they wanted more information about their child's learning, that was in a format that is easier to understand. The second survey was a simplified Start, Stop, Continue survey which we received 4 surveys returned. These families spoke of **Starting**; *Library visits, more water play, introducing more animals, class pet* and **Stopping**; *nothing was added to any of these for this section* and **Continuing**; everything fine the way it is, child looked forward to every day, writing their names in the morning.

With our QIP priority of 'We all Belong', I feel educators really put themselves out among our families to make this happen this year and it was a real success. Most of our clients' needs are dealt with on a day to day basis, through casual conversations. These happened weekly and a lot of time was spent on follow up by the educators where required. i.e through support services etc.

DECD Relevant History Screening

To begin the year all staff was checked to ensure their criminal history screenings were up to date. At our site, all staff, volunteers and other persons identified by legislation or DECD policy have been screened as per the Screening and suitability – Child safety policy.

Improved outcomes for numeracy and literacy	With our focus of improved outcomes for numeracy and literacy many new resources have been purchased to assist in programming for this. We have funded a Site Pupil Free day where all staff were trained in Literacy and Numeracy Indicator development and Results Plus Principles. Pirie Portfolio has continued with the Early Years Hub Meeting each term where we have collaboratively developed a proforma to monitor Lit and Num. To encourage collaborative partnerships with families and identify special resources for Aboriginal 3-year-old children – including literacy learning we have distributed newsletters and fliers to families and attended cultural competence training. Fortnightly staff meetings are incorporated where staff can collaboratively plan for the individual child. Staff have attended Natural Play and sustainability conferences, held visits from the Aboriginal Health Team (rainbow bus) and Lift the lip program.	Development in use of Lit/Num Indicators.
